#### FROM THE PASTOR

# A TIME FOR TRANFORMATION

In our hurried world, we scarcely arrive at one event, one holiday, before the world tells us, "Hurry up! Time to move on to the next big thing!" Our cool mornings and

warm afternoons remind us, however, that the earth's seasons will not be rushed or manipulated.

So, too, does the church practice this rather counter-cultural habit of marking seasons, not simply Holy Days. We are now in the season of Lent, which leads us into the season of Easter. In several weeks, we will begin the long season of Pentecost.

A quaint practice? Outdated?

Perhaps. Or maybe it is exactly what our souls, and minds and bodies, need: time to allow the implications of each major observance to sink in. There is far too much depth, richness, and opportunity to try and contain it all in one day.

Easter is a great example of this. When all the beautiful flowers are gone, the chocolate consumed, the Easter breakfast decorations put away, what of Easter remains? "Christ is risen" is joined by the distinct implication that there are consequences and repercussions. "Christ is risen," and therefore the whole equation has changed. "Christ is risen," and therefore suffering, pain, even death, are transformed. God has the last word. What will be the Easter repercussions in our lives? Can we not dare to hope, even when times seem less than hopeful, because the times are in God's hands? Can we not choose to love extravagantly, because God has shown us how to do just that, in spite of pain and even death? Can we not allow ourselves the freedom to discover new joy in unexpected ways and places and people; for God managed to create new joy with a rolled away stone and a few frightened followers?

Welcome the transforming gift of Easter. Like those early disciples, unlock the doors, let in the fresh air, leave the old hiding place behind. One author says, "I want to declare an open-door policy of the heart; it gets wearisome scrutinizing everyone through the peephole before sliding the deadbolt free. What we celebrate so joyously on Easter Sunday only marks the beginning.

God is set loose in the world, sharing love, hope, compassion, grace, peace, joy, justice and more, drawing forth new life in any way possible. Alleluia!

O Spirit of Christ, fill us with the transforming power of the Resurrection, that we might experience and be a part of the power of God's life-giving love to all creation. Amen.

Come join us at First Congregational United Church of Christ <u>as</u> we worship Christ, our Risen Savior, and discover with us the transforming power of Easter that fills the everyday lives of God's people and the world.

#### In Cambodia, a family's rice field flourishes through drought

Foods Resource Bank's Cambodia-South program #5018 Led by World Renew and various local partners

**Bunthoeun**, 45, his wife and their four children had a successful rice harvest in spite of last year's drought because of the System of Rice Intensification (SRI) he'd learned through FRB's Cambodia-South program. He also applied appropriate farming and poultry-raising techniques he'd mastered at the program's hands-on Farmer Field School (FFS). The various new methods allowed him to provide diverse and nutritious food for his family, and he even had some surplus rice, produce and chickens to sell at the local market. With his newly acquired capital, he has been able to expand his rice field.



Bunthoeun was not always so successful. For many years his rice harvests were poor, and he and his wife struggled to grow vegetables and raise chickens. After continual failures, they were eventually forced to ask two of their children to drop out of school and migrate to Phnom Penh to work in the garment factories.



When the FFS began meeting in his village in 2012, Bunthoeun decided to join. "After becoming a member of the FFS, I learned a lot about agriculture techniques. I never missed a class, was always able to practice what I learned, and got good results," he explained.

With their farming activities expanding, Bunthoeun and his wife can now focus on the education of their two children still living at home. They put a lot of importance on savings so that these two will be able to complete high school, a dream that had vanished for their two older children.

Bunthoeun's positive experiences have reaffirmed his commitment to his farm as a real way to provide for his family and build a future for his children. He enthusiastically shares his know-how with others in his community.

#### Scripture Reference 2 Corinthians 8:13-15

Our desire is not that others might be relieved while you are hard pressed, but that there might be equality.

At the present time your plenty will supply what they need, so that in turn their plenty will supply what you need. The goal is equality, as it is written: "The one who gathered much did not have too much, and the one who gathered little did not have too little."

Through One Great Hour of Sharing, lives are literally changed daily. Your support provides clean water, food, medicines, shelter, healthcare, education and so much more. In 2013, the OGHS offering reached \$2,478,536. An additional \$720 thousand was received to support specific disaster relief initiatives.

#### 1. What is One Great Hour of Sharing<sup>®</sup>?

One Great Hour of Sharing, as part of Our Churches Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in 138 countries. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water and food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, emergency relief, and advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons. OGHS also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response.

#### 2. Who participates in One Great Hour of Sharing?

Eight Christian denominations - American Baptist Church, African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Church of the Brethren, Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Presbyterian Church (USA), Reformed Church in America, the United Church of Christ, and Church World Service work together to develop common promotional materials thereby shar-

ing ideas, costs, and a commitment to faithful service. Each denomination receives and manages its respective OGHS offerings, and together raise about \$12 million each year.

#### 3. How is the United Church of Christ's offering used?

More than 60 percent of the UCC's offering supports international development initiatives, including annual support for missionaries. Currently there are 7 OGHS supported missionaries and 2 Global Mission Interns working in disaster relief, health care, education, and agricultural development. The offering funds disaster preparedness and response, and disaster related volunteer initiatives in the U.S.

#### 4. Where and how are OGHS funds shared?

The United Church of Christ responds to development, disaster, and refugee needs in 138 countries, and provides disaster relief and immigration assistance in the United States.

Funding decisions are made by asking our worldwide mission partners, "What would you have us do with you?" The United Church of Christ responds as a member of organizations such as Church World Service and the ACT Alliance. We also support the direct mission efforts of churches and church-based organizations that the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) have direct partnerships with through Global Ministries. Nearly one-third of the UCC's offering is shared through Church World Service to support refugee, disaster, development, and advocacy programs.

- **5.** How many dollars are given to the UCC's OGHS offering? In 2012, the OGHS offering received just over \$2.5 million. Nearly seventy percent of UCC congregations participate annually.
- **6. What percentage of OGHS donations are used directly for mission?** On average, of every dollar given to One Great Hour of Sharing, 91 cents is used directly for mission programming; 5 cents for interpretation materials and 4 cents for administrative costs which include program monitoring and evaluation (for accountability). Most administrative costs are paid by gifts to Our Church's Wider Mission National Basic Support and endowment funds.

#### 7. How are decisions made to fund the various projects?

Currently, the OGHS Program Committee of the Wider Church Ministries Board meets semi-annually to review expenditures and to address initiatives to increase the promotion of the offering for the United Church of Christ. In addition, a leadership committee is in place that reviews grant requests for special projects internationally.

#### 8. How can I contribute to One Great Hour of Sharing?

The OGHS special mission offering is received through local UCC congregations and all UCC members are encouraged to participate in this way. Local churches will forward gifts to the conference office and all gifts will be forwarded to the United Church of Christ, 700 Prospect Avenue, Cleveland, OH 44115-1100. ### All Things to All People Elissa Johnk

"To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. [...] To the weak I became weak, so that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people . . . . " - 1 Corinthians 9:19-23

#### Dear Paul:

All things to all people? Really?

Here's the thing, Paul: you had a wonderful, tradition-inspiring gift for words. You were, let's be honest, the creator of the sound-bite. But sometimes those 30-second snippets are misleading.

I am positive you were *not* a full-time tent-maker and traveling evangelist, while also being a loyal and devoted family-man, who took care of his relatives, made dinners, cleaned the house, and still had the energy to take his partner out on a romantic date now and then.

You know why I'm certain? Because it's not possible.

I know plenty of people who try to do all those things (except, maybe, the tent-making) because they think it is their good, Christian duty. "I must," they repeat, "be all things to all people." They end up in my office – frazzled, anxious, depressed, and suffering from one broken relationship after another.

I know this isn't what you meant. You know that being everything to everyone usually means nothing to anyone. I'm pretty sure you meant you were able to do one thing, with one person (or group) at a time. And that one thing? It was love.

Jewish, Gentile, weak, powerful – whoever, whatever, however – you *loved* them. You joined people where and as they were, so they might know the love of *God* who joins them where they are.

So can we publish a clarification – an editor's note, of sorts? You, Paul, called to be an apostle of God by Christ Jesus, were <u>not</u> all things to all people. You were one thing – love – to one person at a time.

Yet, through the miracle of the gospel, that's more than enough to reach us all.


#### **VBS NEWS**
