#### SOMEONE IS WATCHING YOU

"What a humbling experience" said one parent, "to see some of your faults and strengths running around on two little legs." Few people would dispute that being a personal example has one of the lasting influences on our children's lives.

You are a personal example as parent, grandparent, sister, brother, aunt, uncle, classmate, spouse, concerned person... which is a powerful influence because of the lessons and attitudes that you model day after day to your children, neighbors, classmates, coworkers, with whomever you come into contact.

Younger children may forget the wording of your rules and advice, but they rarely forget your example. Persons older in age may argue with you, but they will respect more a living model of your values than a spoken description of them. Perhaps this is why God sent Jesus to us – that we might have a living example of God's values: honesty, love, forgiveness, mission, compassion, justice, in the flesh.

How do you keep life in line with your teaching? "Practice what you preach" is the response. Each of us is a living example to someone in our lives.

Who were your childhood heroes? You could probably name several: a president or astronauts, baseball players, a musician, or an actor. Yet a majority of the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> graders in a recent survey found it difficult to name a single role model. Even high school students had a difficult time with that question. Of the children who said they did have role models, the most frequent answer was their parents.

For this generation, unlike the past, negative, problem behavior seems to attract more attention than positive behavior and noteworthy achievements. The alcohol and drug use and sexual incidents of some famous athletes, rock stars, and Hollywood personalities seem to be emphasizing breaking moral codes instead of supporting positive role models. Marian Edelman, child advocate, says, "Telling our children to 'Just say No' is hypocritical and useless while parents and other cultural role models send messages and provide examples that say, 'Yes'".

Studies show that parents and adult friends such as LOGOS, Sunday School, Youth Fellowship, VBS leaders, coaches, and church

friends are by far the most important factor in shaping the kind of adult that children will become.

Some ways to be a great role model:


- Share your values with your children, neighbors, friends, and family. Let them see you pray and read the Bible. Let them know where you stand on drug use, sexual behavior, and other important issues.
- 2) Demonstrate your own sense of self-respect and self-esteem.
- 3) Show that you value your independence. Let children and friends know by your words and actions that you don't just follow the crowd by making your own decisions.
- 4) Set a good example.
- 5) Share your successes and failures. It is important to let others know how you deal with mistakes and 'injuries' and how you grow from them.
- 6) Show that you love and value each member of your family, friends, as well as people of other nationalities.
- 7) Discuss how the media portrays alcohol and drugs, violence and sex.
- 8) Take an interest in our community, our church, community agencies and other people. Do a favor for a neighbor, help others grow up to value kindness and compassion.

May your witness help others discover the love, wisdom, and joy of Christ in their lives as you discover it in your life. Be aware! Someone is watching you, wanting to be just like you!

### **Stewards of Our Relationship with Money**

Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Isaiah 55:1

What a concept: no money, no problem. Come, buy and eat! How can we buy wine and milk, or anything, without money?

Are we so entangled in a life defined by earning and spending – getting what we want if we have money or doing without if we don't – that we may not consider there's another way? The prophet Isaiah promises us there is; a life profoundly connected to the source that meets our deepest needs.

Isaiah asks bluntly: Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food. Isaiah 55:2

We are confronted by the smallness of our vision. During Lent we are invited to examine our lives so that we may reconnect to that which is "bread" for us. Lent offers an opportunity to repent, to turn to a new vision. Listen carefully: eat, delight yourself. Make sure it's the rich food intended for God's beloved. Priceless!

### What does it mean to be an active church member?

The following is taken from a newsletter of a couple of small churches in Missouri.

### The following is taken from Zion-St. Peter's Constitution and By-Laws

<u>Section 1.</u> Members shall live sober, righteous and godly lives. They shall take an active part in the life and work of the church, including regular attendance of the worship service, devout use of the Holy Sacraments, liberal financial support of the church's maintenance and its benevolent obligations, obedience to the established authorities, untiring zeal in bringing others to Christ and sincere endeavor to apply the teachings of Christ in all human relations.

<u>Section 2.</u> A member is required to have his children baptized, instructed and confirmed in the Christian faith and provide Christian teaching in the home.

Section 3. If a member shall neglect to partake of Holy communion, or refuse to contribute to the support of the church, or continuously absent himself from public worship for one year, such conduct shall be deemed worthy of censure and he shall be admonished by the pastor or Spiritual Council. If he then continues in such neglect of duty for another year, the Spiritual council shall notify him that he is no longer in good and regular standing and that his name is being placed on a list of members under Christian discipline. If before the expiration of another year, he shall give evidence of change of heart and conduct, his name shall be returned to the list of active members. If at the end of the third year he shall give no evident of change of heart and conduct, the Spiritual Council shall place his name on the inactive list and notify him of such action.

The following sections were similar to our constitution.

SAVE THE DATES for VBS 2013 at First Church! I hope you have been thinking and praying about your involvement in this year's VBS program. It promises to be another action-packed, fun-filled week. Plans are taking shape, but we are still looking for YOU to help us make it another successful year. Serving as co-directors this year are Marsha Mower and Maureen Ruski. We have a few people that have already committed to join us, but will need lots of additional help to make this a wonderful experience for all involved. As we have the past few years, we want to make this a church-wide endeavor, involving as many people and ministries as possible. We are committed to reaching out to children in our church family and the community. So, don't miss out on this opportunity to be involved!

Our theme is Kingdom Rock - Where Kids Stand Strong for God. We will meet Truman, Duke, Swift, Sir Valiant and Victoria as they help us with our daily Bible Point, Story and Key Verse. We will have an amazing experience that will help kids (and adults) explore God's incredible love for his children. The dates are <u>Sunday</u>, July 21 - <u>Thursday</u>, July 25 from 6:00-8:30, with the preschool children having the option of leaving at 8:05 and dinner available for the volunteers at 5:15 (\$3 per person, per evening).

Areas of need include: Adult Leaders for Imagination Station and Tournament Games; Adult Assistants for Chadder's Royal Theatre & Missions, Imagination Station, The King's Kitchen (snacks), Tournament Games and Pip's Preschool Palace; Crew Leaders and Assistants to shuttle the children through the events each evening; Registration; Decorations and possibly Child Care. We will need help with set-up before and take-down after. Those children who complete 6<sup>th</sup> grade this school year are invited to join us as Assistant Crew Leaders. We also have "staff spots" for mature and responsible Jr/Sr High youth to assist in the various areas.

Monetary donations are always a blessing to help defray costs. We are planning for 65 children this year, with a cost of approximately \$25.00 per week (\$5 per day), per child. We want to provide for any and all children that wish to participate. We encourage you to sponsor a child (or children) for this year's program. Checks should be made payable to First Congregational Church, with a memo for VBS 2013.

Included in the program again this year is a mission project. This year, we will purchase "God's Love for You" Bible books - a kid-friendly Scripture piece, written in Hindi - that will be sent to children in India. Throughout the week, our VBS participants will interact with the Bible books and during the family craft time on Thursday evening, the books will be personalized.
