

A Note from Pastor Ryan

Pastor Ryan

Who's Interpreting Whom?

We are inclined to think that when we open the Scriptures, we're the ones reading and interpreting them. While it's true that we *are* reading and interpreting the Bible, whenever we encounter the written Word of God, something far more profound and transforming is taking place: *the Bible is actually reading and interpreting us!*

Hebrews 4:12 says, "The Word of God is living and active." The LORD said to Isaiah, "My Word that goes forth from my mouth will not return void [that is, it will not fail to accomplish something]" (Isaiah 55:11). Paul said, "All Scripture is God-breathed" (2 Timothy 3:16).

Many people who become pastors, and most who are ordained in the United Church of Christ and our partner denominations, experience Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) as part of their ministry training. During CPE, ministry candidates are placed in nursing homes, hospitals, prisons, mental health facilities, and other institutions to learn the art of "interpreting" themselves and other people. The process of understanding people based on the contexts from which they come, as well as discerning how God is moving both within the lives of the minister and the one being ministered to, is described in the language of CPE as, "reading the human document."

You're probably never thought of yourself as a document that can be read. While you might remain a mystery to others, or even yourself, you are very much an open book to God.

When you encounter the Bible and allow the Scriptures to read and interpret you, the veil on your life and be lifted, as you better come to understand yourself and the solutions God has designed to address your needs.

For starters, the Bible will inform you of those areas in your life where you fall short of God's plans and intensions. Paul wrote, "I wouldn't have known was coveting was, if the law hadn't told me 'Do not covet'" (Romans 7:7). Why do you do the things you do? The Bible will tell you. It will expose your strengths and weaknesses, and it will guide you to the Savior who will put your right with God and empower you by the Spirit

When we approach the Bible from the position of ourselves as chief interpreter, we imply that the Bible must submit to us. If we approach the Scriptures with the attitude that the Bible is reading us with a God's-eye view, we can better appreciate how it is God wants us to live.

I don't want to leave you with the impression that the Bible is always easy to understand; it isn't. At the same time, everyone can benefit from approaching the Good Book with the intention of learning and being blessed. Before the Reformation, clergy were the only people who were authorized to interpret the Scriptures, reckoning that people weren't educated enough to understand them on their own. This worked until the clergy themselves misread the Bible, often under compulsion of the headquarters in Rome. A congregation whose members don't at least know and encounter the Bible on their own can never know if what they are being taught is accurate or not. Ideally, church members will read the Scriptures, pray for the inspiration of the Spirit, and then dialogue with clergy and each other to not only understand the text better, but to understand themselves better. Spiritual growth comes when we open our hearts and ears to the Word of God with humility and hopefulness.

A NOTE ON OFFICE HOURS AND PASTORAL COUNSELING FROM LAST MONTH

Last month, I wrote an article in which I listed the hours I have set aside for pastoral counseling. The times I listed in last month's article (Wednesday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon and Thursday afternoons from 1:30-4:30 p.m.) are **NOT** the only times I am in the building. Rather, these are times I have cleared on my calendar to make sure there are no outside conflicts – clergy gatherings, visitations, sermon prep, and the like – so that people with **pastoral counseling** needs are certain I will be there for them at that moment. I apologize for not making this clear in last month's column.

I have learned that some of you aren't familiar with pastoral counseling or why I posted those hours. Please allow me to explain. As a former hospital chaplain, I am trained in therapeutic techniques to help people, one-on-one or as couples and a family, to tackle issues like relationship strife, addiction, spiritual confusion, and overcoming destructive habits. This is not something all pastors are trained to do, and I am very happy I can share these skills with you – free of charge!

Pastoral ethics require me to list times available for counseling services, as well as making sure counseling only occurs during hours when other people are in the building. I am not permitted to counsel people in emotionally vulnerable situations if the individual and I are the only ones in the building – this is part of the recommendations that accompany "Safe Church" approaches and are critical guidelines to follow in the #MeToo era

In addition to Sundays, I am normally in the office Mondays through Thursdays – save for meetings or visitations and such -- so please feel free to knock on my door and share anything with me or ask questions. You also can call my cell at (217) 413-4272, text me, or drop me an email at pastorryan@firstchurchdecatur.org anytime, as some of you do on a regular basis. I usually respond quickly. Those of you who've gotten my 11 p.m. texts, 9 p.m. phone calls, or 5 a.m. emails know I'm within reach 24-7, and that I am working even at hours well outside 8:30 to 4. This is the modern reality for my generation of pastors, as technology makes us accessible for even routine matters at all times.

Even during those designated pastoral counseling hours, you still can pop in to discuss any other issue, even if it isn't counseling related. You don't have to wait to catch me on Monday or Tuesday instead.

I am encouraged by the number of people who have responded to my invitation and have already come to see me for counseling or stated they plan to do so. We've definitely seen an uptick in people inquiring about this since I announced it, and if you would like to take advantage of this opportunity, please let me know!

NOTE: Please understand that pastoral counseling is NOT licensed professional counseling. If I ever sense your situation would be better addressed by a mental health professional, I am legally and ethically obligated to refer you to one.

Our 5-acre corn crop is growing very quickly. As you can see by this picture, the crop is almost as tall as Gehrig. It is enjoying the rain we received the week of June 10. We will be approaching pollination in about a week. Pollination is when the tassels appear and produce pollen to fall on the silks. When pollinated, each silk will form one kernel of corn on an ear. This is the most important weather period for corn. We want adequate moisture and no excessive heat.

If you would like to make a donation to help pay the cost of planting this crop, donation envelopes can be found in the pews and may be placed in the offering baskets or delivered to the church office. Please make your check payable to First Congregational UCC, and indicate that it is for our FRB growing project.
