A Note from Pastor Jan



Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy. Matthew 5:7

Mercy....the meaning of the Greek word for 'mercy' (eleos: the personification of pity, mercy, clemency, and compassion) translates something like, 'trying to get into someone else's skin to understand things from his or her perspective. When we do this, it tends to change everything: we are more understanding with each other and less likely to hold grudges. We all need to give and receive more of this kind of mercy.

Grace.....the meaning of the Greek word for 'grace' (chari: Graciousness of manner or act, unmerited love and favor of God. Grace is from God and nothing we do can make God bless us with grace. Grace is totally undeserved (and most needed).

Grace, it has been said, is a greater gift than love (which is pretty great!) because grace is love in action. Because God love us, God blesses us with grace.

The short shrift is: grace is getting what you don't deserve and mercy is not getting what you deserve.


I understand grace and mercy as bookends: grace is from God directly, mercy is through Christ's sacrifice on the cross.

There is no place where we can go that grace and mercy is not present. God's blessings of grace and mercy rest upon us, follow us, lead us, guide us, protect us each and every day of our lives. God asks us to share the blessings of grace and mercy with the people we meet and those we hear about, those who are needy, those who are not; those who are sick and those who are the picture of health; those we are different from us and those who are similar. In other words, to everyone!

The world would be a MUCH better place if Christians would be those who share these bookend blessings!

Thank you to these First Church volunteers who helped deliver Meals on Wheels the week of September 2:



Gifts of Love

I John 4:7-21

here is a significant difference between ideals and values. Ideals are those things which we say we believe. Values are those things that our living says we believe. I might claim I am opposed to racism and that it is inconsistent with the Christian faith. However, unless I am living in intentional ways and making choices in my life to combat racism, it is just an ideal. When I actively participate in the process of dismantling systemic racism, even when it is at personal cost, it becomes a value. A friend of mine once said, "I can hear your ideals, but I can see your values."

Claiming faith in Christ should lead to certain patterns of behavior if our faith is the basis for our values. The author of I John reminds us that to say we love God, but then live in ambivalence about our neighbor, is to have "outed ourselves as liars." The love we are to have for one another is one that is evidenced in selfless acts toward another, much in the same way that God displays Divine love for us.

Faith is action – it is verb. It is based on God's love for us and therefore it is fearless. It is willing to risk because it knows it can trust God for the outcome. How is it that people are to know we are Jesus' disciples? By the love we have for one another. The evidence is written all over our lives. Loving God implies loving neighbor as self.

So, what might "fearless stewardship" look like? What would it mean to give of ourselves so completely and confidently that our generosity would reflect our value of loving God and one another in the same way that God has loved us? What might our congregation look like if such a way of loving was more than just an ideal but something we truly valued?

Homecoming Weekend

Teaching and Tasting with Chef Michael Stubblefield Saturday, September 7



The Teaching and Tasting went very well today! 15 of us were able to taste incredible foods that are from Bible times (or foods made with food that was around during Bible times. This one should be an annual affair!

For those who missed it.....here are the recipes from Chef Stubblefield's Teaching and Tasting program:

Fried Goat Cheese Balls with Honey (with roasted almonds or pistachios)

Canola Oil for frying ¹/₄ c cornstarch ³/₄ c all-purpose flour 1 cup Club Soda 1-10oz log of fresh goat cheese Honey, chopped roasted almonds/pistachios And freshly ground pepper, for serving. 3 c Panko lightly crushed Salt 1 large egg, lightly beaten

Step 1. Cut goat cheese log into 16 pieces and roll each piece into a ball. Refrigerate on wax paper -lined baking sheet. (about 10 minutes)

Step 2. In a bowl, whisk the egg and club soda. Gradually whisk in the flour and cornstarch and season with salt. Spread the panko in a shallow bowl. Dip the cheese balls in the egg batter, dredge them in the panko. Coat the balls again in the egg batter and panko. Return them to the baking sheet and freeze just until firm. (about 15 min)

Step 3. In a large saucepan, heat 2 inches of canola oil to 375 degrees. Working in batches, fry the cheese balls over high heat, turning occasionally until golden and crisp, (about 2 minutes). Using a slotted spoon, transfer the balls to a paper towel-lined plate and season with Kosher salt. Transfer the cheese balls to a platter, drizzle with honey and sprinkle with pistachio's or almonds and pepper. Serve hot.

Unleavened Bread

2 cups + 2 TBSP flour 1 cup cold water ½ tsp Kosher salt

1. combine salt and flour together in a large bowl, stir in the water until the cough comes together. Knead for 5 minutes.

2. pre-heat skillet over medium-low heat.

3. Pinch off 7 pieces of dough and form into balls. Roll out each piece on a lightly floured surface (approx.. 6-7" ovals)

4. Cook on a hot skillet for 2 minutes on each side. Serve or store covered.

Roasted Honey Figs

15 ripe figs cut in half 1 cup light honey 4 tsp lemon juice Flakey sea salt such as Maldon for sprinkling

1. Peheat oven to 375 deg. Line a baking pan with parchment paper. Put figs on the pan, cut side up and drizzle with honey

2. Bake until bubbling, tender, and lightly caramelized, about 20 minutes

3. Remove from oven and sprinkle with lemon juice and salt. Serve warm

Tapenade*

1/2 pound pitted and mixed olives

2 anchovy fillets, rinsed

1 small clove garlic, minced

2 TBLS capers

2-3 fresh basil leaves

1 TBLS freshly squeezed lemon juice

2 TBLS extra virgin olive oil

1. Thoroughly rinse the olives in cool water. Place all ingredients in the bowl of a food processor. Process to combine, stopping to scrape down the sides of the bowl, until the mixture becomes a coarse paste, approx.. 1-2 minutes total. Transfer to a bowl and serve.

*Chef Stubblefield put the Tapenade on the Matzah bread and served it in quarters.

Chef Stubblefield is also teaching a Foods of the Bible class this fall at RCC for all interested.

Additionally, Mound Chapel of God is hosting Chef to teach about Bible foods/herbs each Thursday from September 25 – November 6 – free to the public. Check with the church for times.

HARVEST OF HOPE GROWING PROJECT UPDATE – September 17

Our growing project corn crop has not yet reached physiological maturity (black layer). We are anxious to start harvest because the stalk quality is deteriorating. We hope to start harvest in about 10 days. We will not be having a Harvest Celebration this year, but we are planning another activity in Fellowship Hall for later in the season.

Our church members and friends are still bringing in their excess garden produce for sale by donation during Fellowship Hour. Check the table near the door for some last-of-the-season vegetables.

If you would like to participate in this project, there are envelopes in the church pews and on the bulletin board in Fellowship Hall, or you may mark your donation "Growing Hope Globally" and the money counters will get it in the appropriate account. This is the 14th growing project for our church and these proceeds will benefit people in West Africa to help them become food sustainable and never go hungry again.




